EARLY REPORT - August 5, Contest Day 8

The weather in Leszno is predicted to be blue with thermals going to around 4,000 ft at 3-5 knots. In all a very soarable day but on the weak and low side of the scale. The briefing



gets under way at 10:00 with launching scheduled for 11:45 but this is delayed to 12:00 as the sniffer reports weak climbs and low thermal tops.

Launching starts at 12:15 and 46 minutes later all are in the air for a new launch record. Its a very



slow start with big gaggles but then cu start to form locally and they are off to the races.




All tasks today are Assigned Area Tasks except for the Open Class. Standard Class, Assigned Area Task: 4h 15' (283.0-585.2 km), 15-Meter, Assigned Area Task:

4h 15' (260.7-648.0 km), 18-Meter, Assigned Area Task: 4h (283.3-659.1 km), Open Racing Task: 495.5 km.

The starts are as follows. Chip and Tom are underway just after 1:30, with the German and British teams going later in the 1:40 range. Karl and Dave start at 1:44 which is near the end of the pack, Gary goes at 1:43 which is near the end of the 18-Meters and Ron starts at 1:34 along with almost everyone in the Open class.

Closing 10th August Most competitors have started by 1:40 and are on course. By 5:13 the first finishers are on final glide. It sounds like the day started slow but then turned into decent soaring with



some cu then a drying trend late. A report comes in that Gary Ittner has landed out. Gary is carrying a tracking unit today and it looks like Gary is down. Confirmed by Rick. Just before 6:00 many finishers are on their way in with impressive (see below) finishes in action. By 5:51 45 are home. By 6:08 alomst 90 are back. By 6:30 almost 120 back. All U. S. Team pilots are home save Gary Ittner.



The preliminary results in the Standard Class Chip Garner was 17th and Tom Beltz 31st. In the 15-Meter, Karl Striedieck palced 23rd and Dave Mockler was 25th. In the 18-Meter Gary Ittner landed out

and does not yet have a score. The big news of the day for the USA was in the Open class with Ron Tabery placing 2nd just behind leader Holger Karow.

From Rick - Everyone but Gary got home today (he's not back yet). On our team, Ron probably turned in the best performance. He got back early, and hopped out of the Nimbus with a big grin on his face. When asked how he did against the Etas, he replied "I smoked 'em!" It's still too early to tell how everyone else did today. The score sheet is very volatile at the moment.

The French and German teams have collaborated to put on an "Old Europe" party tonight. At briefing this



morning, they announced that they do



not intend to run out of either wine or beer. The party started half an hour ago, and I don't intend to test their claim: I'm showing up early. Bye.

FINISH FOLLIES by Rick Sheppe



The airfield is a giant quadrilateral, two of whose boundaries are finish lines. The line we've been using recently is "Finish Line West," which the gliders cross while heading east. The

trailers and tiedowns are on the opposite side of the field, so the gliders usually land straight ahead after crossing the line.

This setup has several consequences. The first is that instead of high-speed finishes, the crowd is treated to high-speed landings. Approaching gliders can be spotted quite a ways out, backlit by the sun. We know they've crossed the line when they do a slight pullup to open the spoilers. They carry on for another half a mile, trying desperately to lose energy. At touchdown, they are still pointed right at us. If all goes well (i.e. no groundloop), the glider comes to rest a few hundred yards in front of us, still pointing head on. This is a problem, because we still can't be sure who it is. We're getting used to waiting for the canopy to open and identifying our pilots by how they wave. Then we rush out and greet them. The ones that groundloop are much easier to identify.

Another consequence of this finish procedure is that we aren't getting any dramatic photoops. The sun is in our eyes, and the very nose of a glider isn't all that photogenic. We are



looking for the opportunity when we can dispatch a spare crew member with a camera to the cornfield on the other side of the finish line. We have also had the idea of ascending the clocktower in the little village half a mile out. The finishers go by at

the level of the clock. So far, we don't have any spare personnel for the job.

Finally, I have to describe the learning curve associated with this method of finishing. During the practice week, we watched gliders touching down at over 100 knots, sometimes with flaps up, and long wings bending to the limits as spoilers were opened at high speed. World-class pilot induced oscillations! Picture the hundred best glider pilots in the world making six-bounce touchdowns. We loved it.

UPDATE ON JOHN GOOD

Rick reports that John is doing very well and back to his old self. It looks like he will visit the airfield today for several hours and be discharged tomorrow. - John Seaborn

Country and Contest Site



Leszno is well situated in the western part of Poland in Wielkopolska (Great Poland) between Poznañ and Wroclaw. Three European capitals: Warsaw, Berlin and Prague are all situated approximately 300km away from Leszno. Since 1 January 1999 Leszno has been one of the 68

administrative districts. Labor turmoil in 1980 led to the formation of the independent trade union "Solidarity" that over time became a political force and by 1990 had swept parliamentary elections and the presidency. A "shock therapy" program during the early 1990s enabled the country to transform its economy into one of the most robust in Central Europe, boosting hopes for acceptance to the EU. Poland joined the NATO alliance in 1999.
