The competition officials are testing out a new live tracking system called VPTracker that allows for real time 3-D flight reporting. The transponders are tiny - about the size of a package of cigarettes and suction-cupmount onto an

unobtrusive place in the cockpit. Bob and Manfred were among those randomly chosen to carry the trackers today. During the contest, the top overall pilots and the previous day's winner will be tracked, with their flights being broadcast (with a time delay) in the hospitality tent.

All of the U.S. gliders have passed their technical inspections today, and Tim's Libelle is of particular interest to everyone here because of its landing gear - it has a dual undercarriage (like an ASW 22).





This fine example of a Libelle 201b belongs to Christian Streifeneder of Germany, but it used to belong to someone who converted it into a motorglider. He modified the landing gear and used a removable polemounted motor behind the cockpit to fly around the skies of Switzerland under power! Christian has since patched the holes for the motor, but the one-of-a-kind gear remains. It is wacky but it works, and it's a great conversation starter, even with people who don't speak English.

#### **Country and Contest Site**



Elverum/Starmoen, the home of the 3rd Club Class World Gliding Championships, is located 147 km northeast from the centre of Oslo, the Capital of Norway. Gliding over the Norwegian countryside is an incredible experience. Located at 60 degrees north latitude, the Norwegian summer brings long hours of daylight, allowing gliding under the "midnight sun" (even if you have to go 700 km to the north to see the sun at midnight proper). The thermals start early in the morning, and often last until

20:00 hrs. The thermal conditions are good with a generally high cloud bases. More information on the weather conditions can be found on the weather page. Visibility of 50 to 100 km and above is not unusual on sunny days. The conditions are often perfect for long distance flights. The airspace is generally free of restrictions, with only the Oslo / Gardermoen TMA to the south-west of the task area. Map courtesy of the CIA. See the CIA site for a fact sheet on Norway.
