


different start cylinders, how pilots will be scored if they leave the competition area, and many, many important details.

Afterwards, the captains drew for the pilots' start order. The Deputy Competition Director, Hans Petter Fure, held a bowl full of paper slips,

each with a competition numbers a pilot on it. Each team captain drew one slip at a time until every start position was assigned. Tim's number is 8, Manfred's is 10, and Bob's is 17. These positions will rotate throughout the competition.

Today's final official practice task was an assigned area task to the north, but the weather at the 10 a.m. pilots' briefing looked questionable for a 303.6 km minimum distance task over rough, mountainous terrain. The launch was postponed until 12:30, but once the fleet took off, just about everyone stayed aloft. Most pilots flew only part of the task - why risk anything on the last practice day - but a few completed the task. There were several land-outs, and



apparently one injured glider (the pilot was OK). The day ended up much better than predicted.

Tim was interviewed by NRK1 (the main national radio station) while waiting on the grid this morning. We don't know if he's been on the radio or not, but there has certainly been good media coverage of the competition in Norway so far.

Tomorrow is the opening ceremony in Elverum, the town closest to Starmoen. We will march in a parade, listen to speeches, and attend a reception at the town hall. Then we will return to Starmoen for a display of various types of flying ("but it's not an airshow," emphasized one of the organizers) followed by a chicken dinner. We're all looking forward to the festivities, but, of course, the soaring forecast for tomorrow looks incredible, but there will be no flying for us. Oh well...

That's it for tonight. I'm off to find a way to connect to the internet so that I can post this for you all!

Country and Contest Site



Elverum/Starmoen, the home of the 3rd Club Class World Gliding Championships, is located 147 km northeast from the centre of Oslo, the Capital of Norway. Gliding over the Norwegian countryside is an incredible experience. Located at 60 degrees north latitude, the Norwegian summer brings long hours of daylight, allowing gliding under the "midnight sun" (even if you have to go 700 km to the north to see the sun at midnight proper). The thermals start early in the morning, and often last until

20:00 hrs. The thermal conditions are good with a generally high cloud bases. More information on the weather conditions can be found on the weather page. Visibility of 50 to 100 km and above is not unusual on sunny days. The conditions are often perfect for long distance flights. The airspace is generally free of restrictions, with only the Oslo / Gardermoen TMA to the south-west of the task area.
